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- This is the only way to keep our young people.

Notice the terminology?

- We need to embrace <u>contemporary</u> worship versus <u>traditional</u> worship
 - The argument from culture
- When I'm doing contemporary worship I really encounter God through <u>praise</u> and <u>worship.</u>
 - The argument from experience

What about culture?

- 1 Corinthians 9:19-22 "All things to all people"
- But notice:
 - The context is not worship, but the right of the apostle to be supported by the church
 - The focus is not culture, but the gospel:
 - ""Woe to me if I do not peach the gospel!" vs. 16
 - "I do it all for the sake of the gospel" vs. 23
 - "I discipline my body and keep it under control, lest after preaching to others I myself should be disqualified."

Embrace today's culture?

When I attend services that feature "contemporary" worship today, it seems that 80 percent to 90 percent of all the songs sung by the congregation prominently feature that familiar trinity of I, Me, My. What's at the heart of iWorship?

- God is no longer at the center of worship. Worship is now about what I get out of it, about how I feel and what I need.
- How did iWorship come about?



- The worship service tended to be more doctrinal, more biblical, more about God than about my experience.
- iWorship is a reaction to this objective and factual approach to Worship. In the 1800s, there was a swing to the personal experience of the believer.
 Worship became subjective and emotional.


A Paradigm Shift



What is worship?

- Worship comes from the English word, "worthship" – meaning celebrating one who is "worthy."
- Worship is responding to what God has done for you by praising Him with your life, words and song.
- Worship is also the experience of a relationship with the triune God.

THE MARKET-DRIVEN CHURCH



- Basic Premise:
 - Find out what people want
 - Provide it for them
 - Seek to give the gospel along the way

INSIDE THE MIND OF UNCHURCHED HARRY AND MARY

- If more than 90% of the population express some form of belief in God and a desire for a relationship with Him, but less than half of the population ever attends church what conclusion should you draw?
- Lee Strobel concludes, "Harry has rejected church, but that doesn't necessarily mean he has rejected God."

GARY GILLEY'S REBUTTAL

Yet the Bible clearly says that humanity does reject God... What surveys really show is that people do not reject gods of their own creation and imagination; but they do reject the true God. What we supposedly learn from marketing study is that the reason why Harry doesn't come to church has little to do with his rebellious, Godrejecting nature. Rather it is because the church is boring, predictable, irrelevant, money hungry and does not meet his needs.

CHANGING THE MESSAGE?

The expressed design of the user-friendly philosophy is to make unconverted sinners feel comfortable with the Christian message. The only way this is possible, I fear, is to change the message. *Pages 68 - 69*



Do ADVENTIST CHURCHES GROW BY USING ENTERTAINMENT?

- Most research shows the following:
 - Adventist Churches grow through evangelism and through committed churches that effectively reach out to their community
 - There is no conclusive evidence that changing the worship style has any significant impact on whether an Adventist Church will grow.

Do we still need doctrine?





High Expectations?

• "Sometimes the conventional wisdom to reach the unchurched has been to lower expectations, to tell guests we really do not expect anything from them.... [but] the unchurched are more likely to return if they understand the church expects much of their members... People have no desire to be part of something that makes no difference."

SURPRISING INSIGHTS FROM THE UNCHURCHED

- When asked what factors led them to choose this church?
 - 90% said it was the pastor/preaching
 - 88% said it was the doctrines
 - 49% said it was the friendliness of the members
 - Then it was being witnessed to (41%), family (38%), sensing God's presence (37%), a friendship (25%), Adult, youth, children classes (25%)
 - Only 11% said that worship style influenced them

SUMMARY

- What the unchurched want is... "meaty preaching"
- "The formerly unchurched told us that they were attracted to strong biblical teaching and to understanding Christian doctrine. Pastors who understand this and who communicate doctrine clearly are among the leaders whose churches are reaching the unchhurced."












Desire for Instant Intimacy

Rarely do we sing songs that remind us of our identity as the body of Christ, the people of God. There are simply too few we songs in our congregational gatherings. It seems that many songwriters have taken songs directly from their personal devotional life into the assembly, without considering the possibility of adapting the songs for congregational use. In cultures that are already dominated by narcissism, this is unwise and dangerous.

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it seems that it does not matter if I sing during worship, for I cannot hear myself even if I do. Nor can I hear the brothers and sisters sitting near me. In fact, we can only hear those few people standing up front with their microphones. Sometimes, we barely hear even them, because their voices are also drowned out by the amplified instruments that are supposedly accompanying all of us as we sing.

 For one thing, while attempting to reach the unchurched, churches may actually be "unchurching the churched" (as Michael Horton argues) or otherwise "dumbing down" for the sake of evangelism (as Marva Dawn puts it). I know of a church, for example, that has printed the Scripture text in the bulletin or projected it on screen each week for the seekers who might be attending without a Bible in hand. An unintended consequence, however, has been that the believers have stopped bringing their Bibles and the sound of pages rustling as the saints move from passage to passage during the sermon is seldom heard.
