




Manna, is computed to have bin more then might have well fuffie'd the heartiest feeder thrice as many meals. For those actions which enter into a man, rather then iffue out of him, and therefore defile not, God uses not to esprivat under a perpetuall childhood of prescription, but trufts him with the gift of reason to be his own chooser; there were but little work left for preaching if law and compulsion should grow fo fast upon those things which hertofore were govern'd only by exhortation. Salemen informs as that much reading is a wearines to the flesh; but neither he, nor other inspir'd author tells us that such, or fuch reading is unlawfull: yet certainly had God thought good to limit us herein, it had bin much more expedient to have told us what was unlawfull, then what was wearifome. As for the burning of those Ephesian books by St. Pauls converts, tis reply'd the books were magick, the Syriack to renders them. It was a privat act, a vofuntary act, and leaves us to a voluntary imitation : the men in remorfe burnt thole books which were their own; the Magistrae by this example is not appointed : these men practiz'd the books, another might perhaps have read them in fome fort ulefully. Good and evill. we know in the field of this World grow up together almost inteparably; and the knowledge of good is fo involved and interwoven with the knowledge of evill, and in fo many cunning refemblances hardly to be difcern'd, that those confused feeds which were imposed on Pfychr as an inceffant labour to call out, and fort afunder, were not more intermixt. It was from out the rinde of one apple tailed, that the knowledge of good and evill as two twins cleaving together. leapt forth into the World. And perhaps this is that doom which edder fell into of knowing good and evill, that is to fay of knowing good by evill. As therefore the flate of man now is; what wildome can there be to choose, what continence to forbeare withour the knowledge of evill? He that can apprehend and confider vice with all her baits and feeming pleafores, and yet abitain, and yet diftinguish, and yet prefer that which is truly better, he is the true watfaring Christian I cannot praise a fugitive and clother'd vertue, unexercis'd& unbreath'd, that never fallies out and fees her adverfary, but flinks out of the race, where that immortall garland is to be run for , not without dust and heat. Afteredly we bring not innocence into the world, we bring impurity much rather a that which parifies us is triall, and recall is by what is contrary. That vertue therefore which is but a youngling in the contemplation of evill, and knows not the utmost

that vice promifes to her followers, and rejects it, is but a blank vertue , not a pure ; her whitenesse is but an excrementall whitenesse : Which was the reason why our fage and serious Poet Spencer, whom I dare be known to think a better tracher then Seeins or Against, delcribing true temperance under the person of Griss, brings him in with his palmer through the cave of Mammon , and the bowr of earthly bliffe that he might fee and know, and yet abitain. Since therefore the knowledge and furvay of vice is in this world to necessary to the con-Rituting of human vertue, and the scanning of error to the confirmation of truth, how can we more fafely, and with leffe danger fcout into the regions of fin and fallity then by reading all manner of trastats, and hearing all manner of reason? And this is the benefit which may be had of books promifenously read. But of the harm that may refult hence three kinds are usually reckn'd. First, is tear'd the injection that may spread; but then all human learning and controversie in religious points must remove out of the world, year he Bible it felfe; for that of times relates blafphemy not nicely, it describes the carnall sense of wicked men not une legantly, it brings in holieft men paffionately marmuring against providence through all the arguments of Epicarest in other great difputes it answers dubiously and darkly to the common reader : And ask a Talmudift what ails the modelly of his marginall Keri, that Mofes and all the Prophets cannot perfusale him to pronounce the textuall Chetiv. For these causes we all know the Bible it felfe put by the Papitt into the first rank of prohibited books. The ancientest Fathers must be next removed, as Climent of Alexandrie, and that Eufebien book of Evangelick preparation, transmitting out ears through a hoard of heathenish obscenities to receive the Gospel. Who finds not that Ireneus, Epiphanius, Jerom, and others discover more herelies then they well confute, and that oft for berelie which is the truer opinion. Nor boots it to fay for thefe, and all the heathen Writers of greatest intection, if it must be thought so, with whom is bound up the life of human learning, that they writ in an unknown tongue, to long as we are fure those languages are known as well so the work of men, who are both most able, and most dailgent to install the poison they fack, first into the Courts of Princes, acquainting them with the choifest delights, and criticisms of fin. As perhaps did that Petronius whom Nere call'd his Arbiter, the Mafter of his pevels; and that notorious ribald of Areas, dreaded, and yet dear to the Italian Courtiers. I name not him for posterities sake; whom Harry

- Pray intensely





















