- 2.) Much of the same pruning needs
- 3.) They both self-pollinate
- 4.) Many of the same planting needs
- 5.) Prone to a lot of the same diseases
- 6.) Carry a powerful cancer-fighting punch

Differences

Raspberries

- 1.) Grow best in different climates
- 2.) Berries grow out of different parts of the plant
- 3.) Different means of regenerating/sending out new plants
- 4.) Receptacle retention at harvest

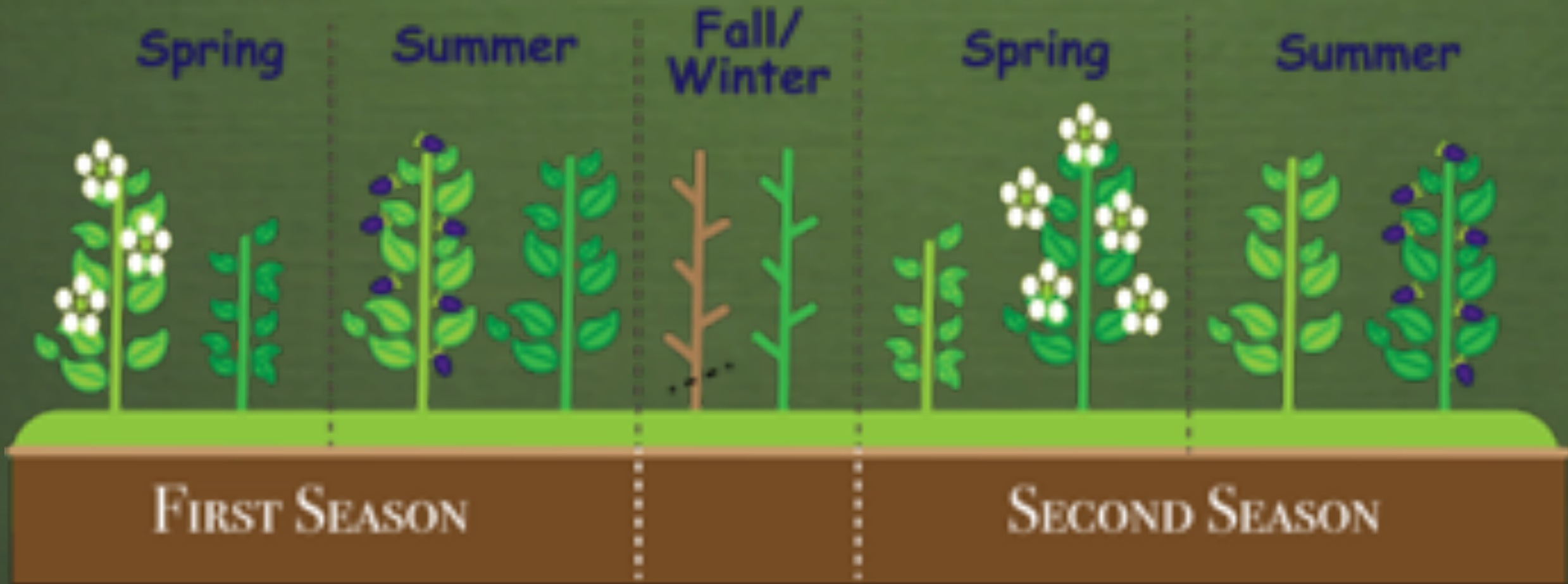

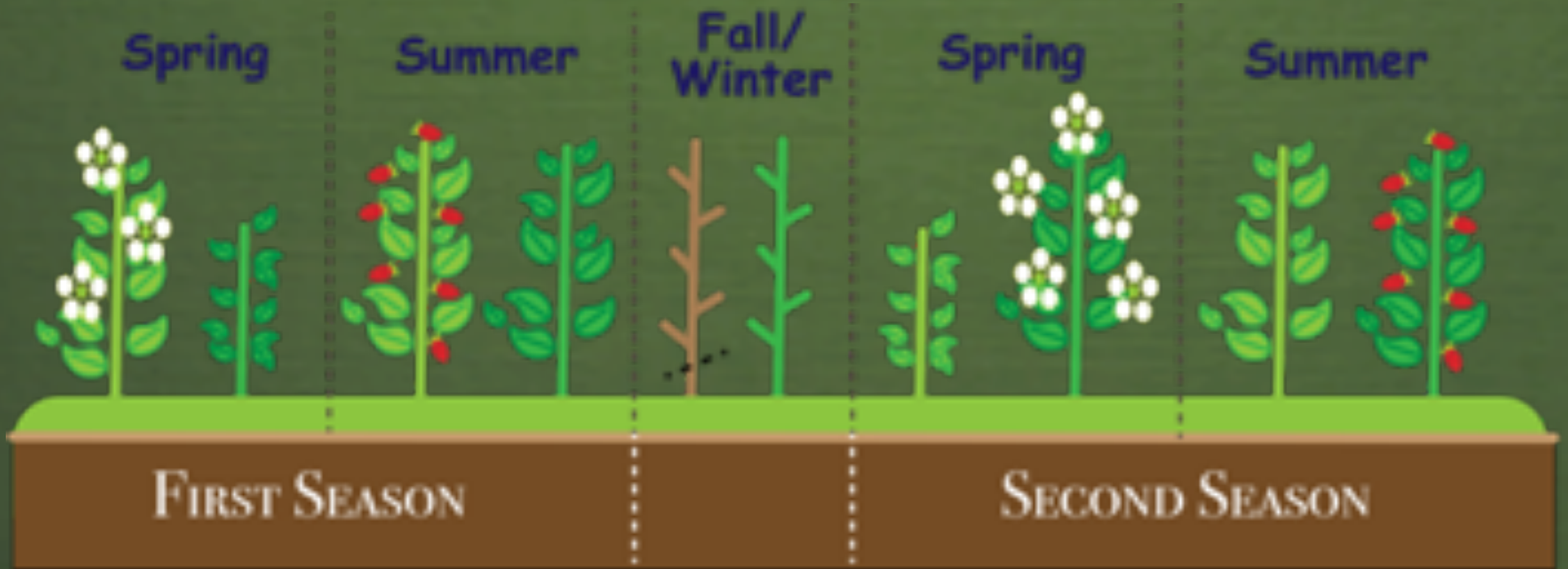

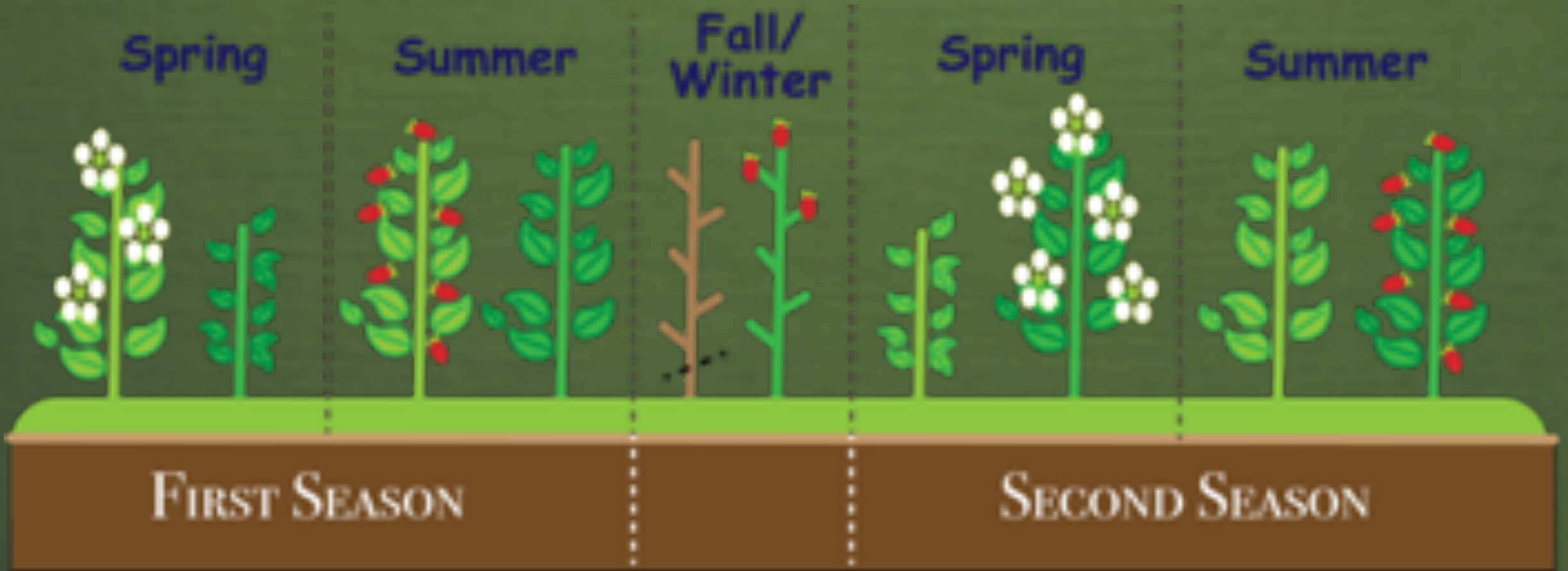
Blackberry Life-Cycle

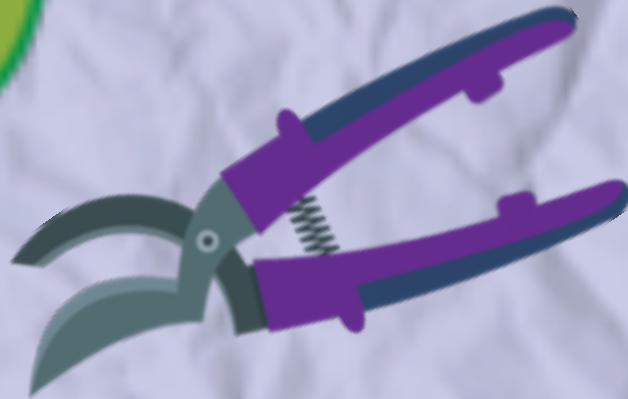

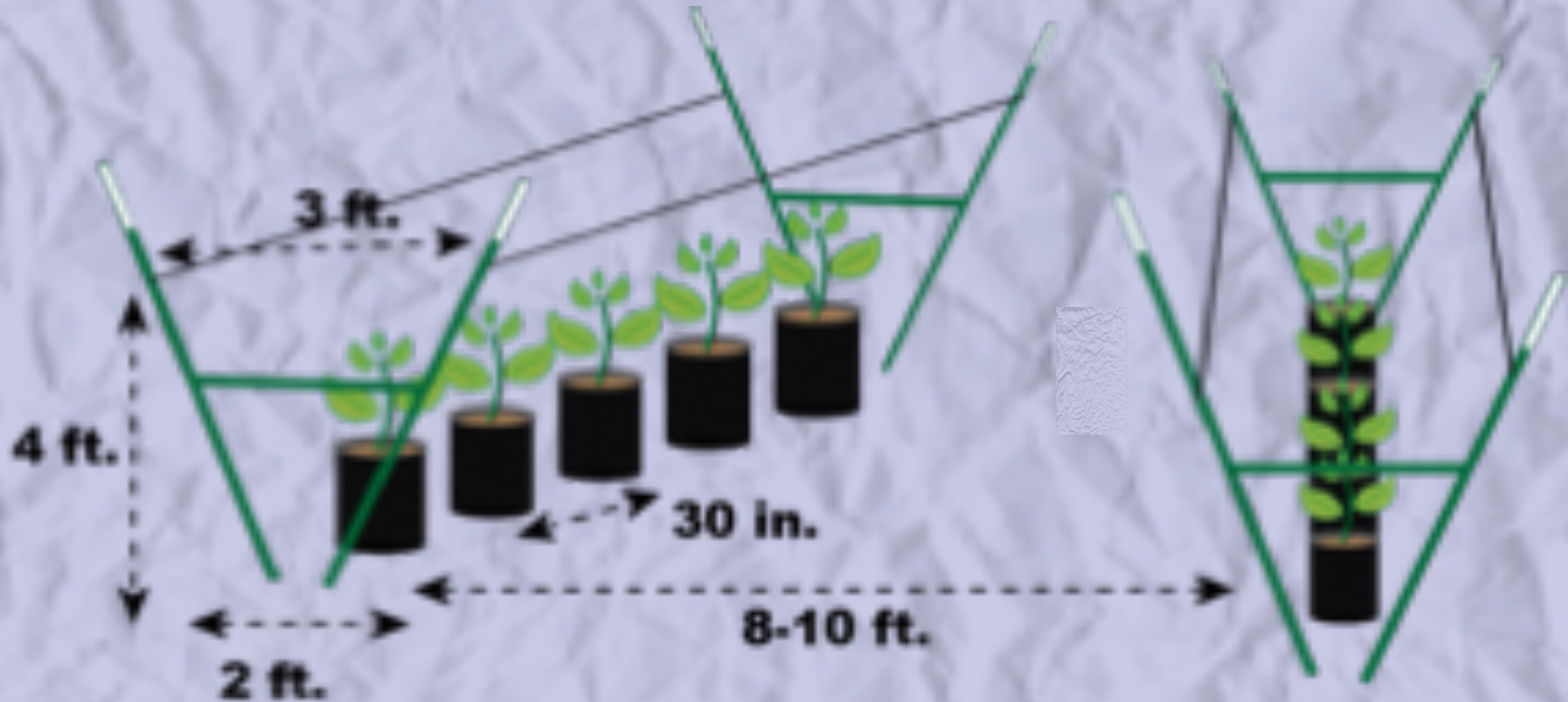

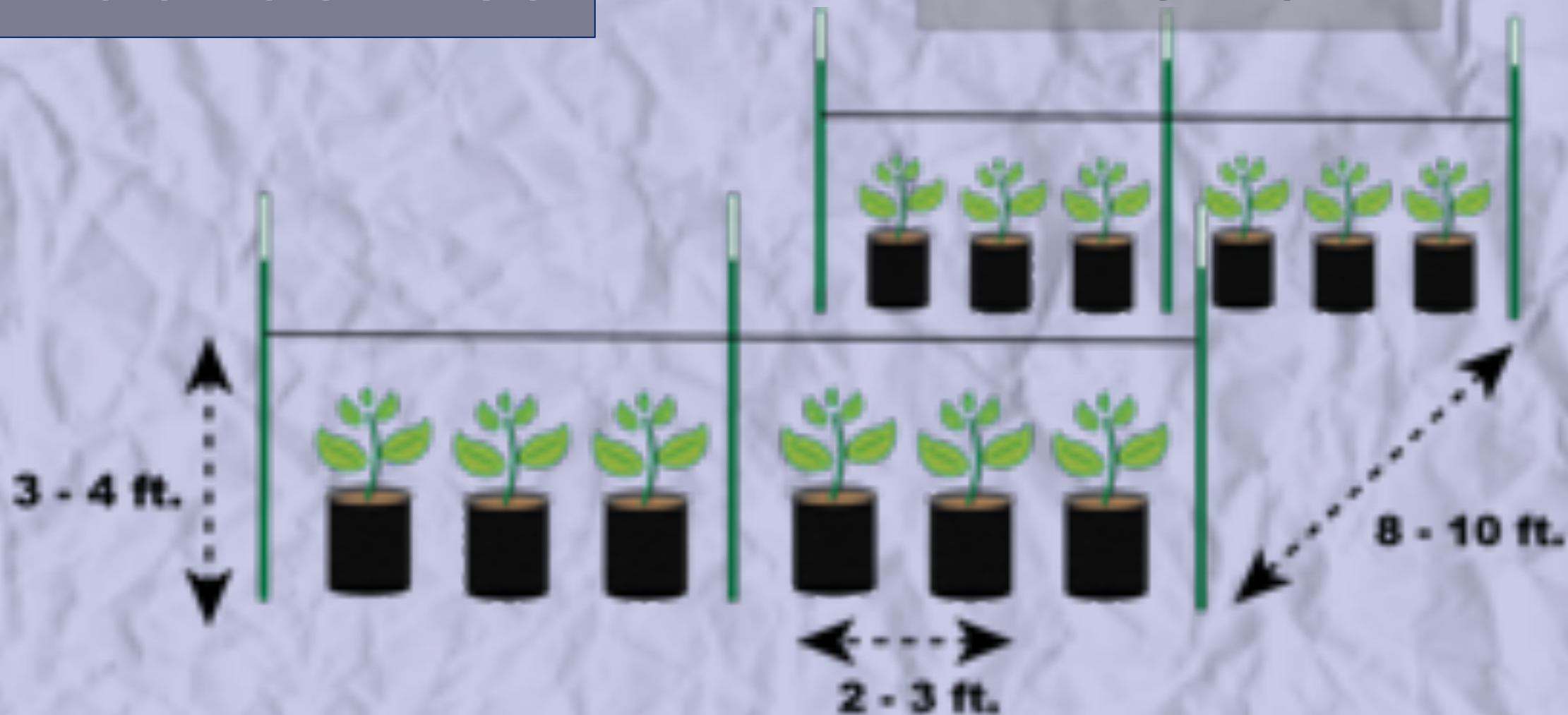

Growing Tips

- Add a rich in nitrogen compost at bloom
- Irrigate well during berry development and after harvest
- Allow hardening of canes for winter by withholding water
- Mulch for weed control
- Don't plant near peppers, eggplants, roses, tomatoes or potatoes (hosts fungus that causes root rot)

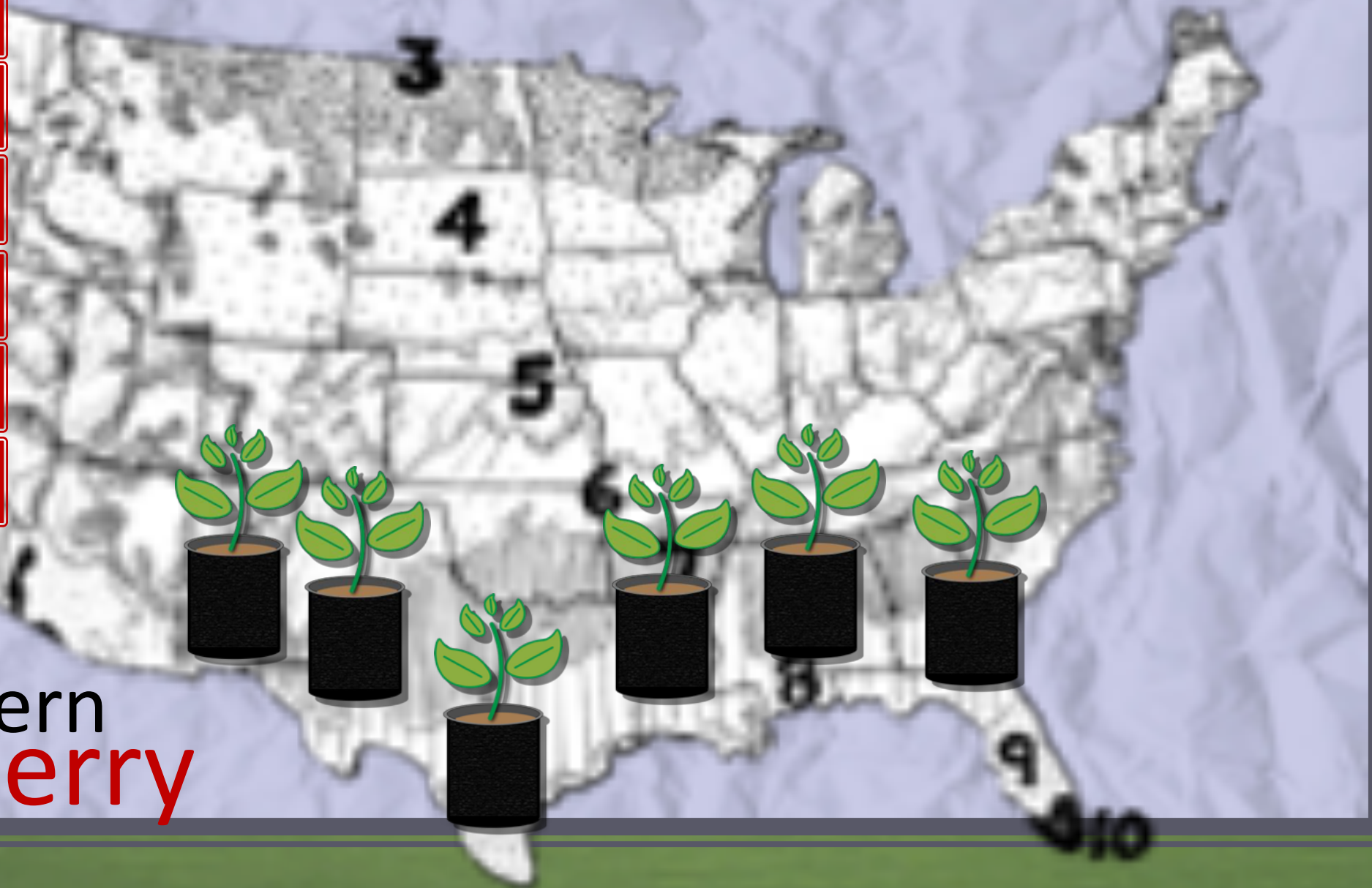

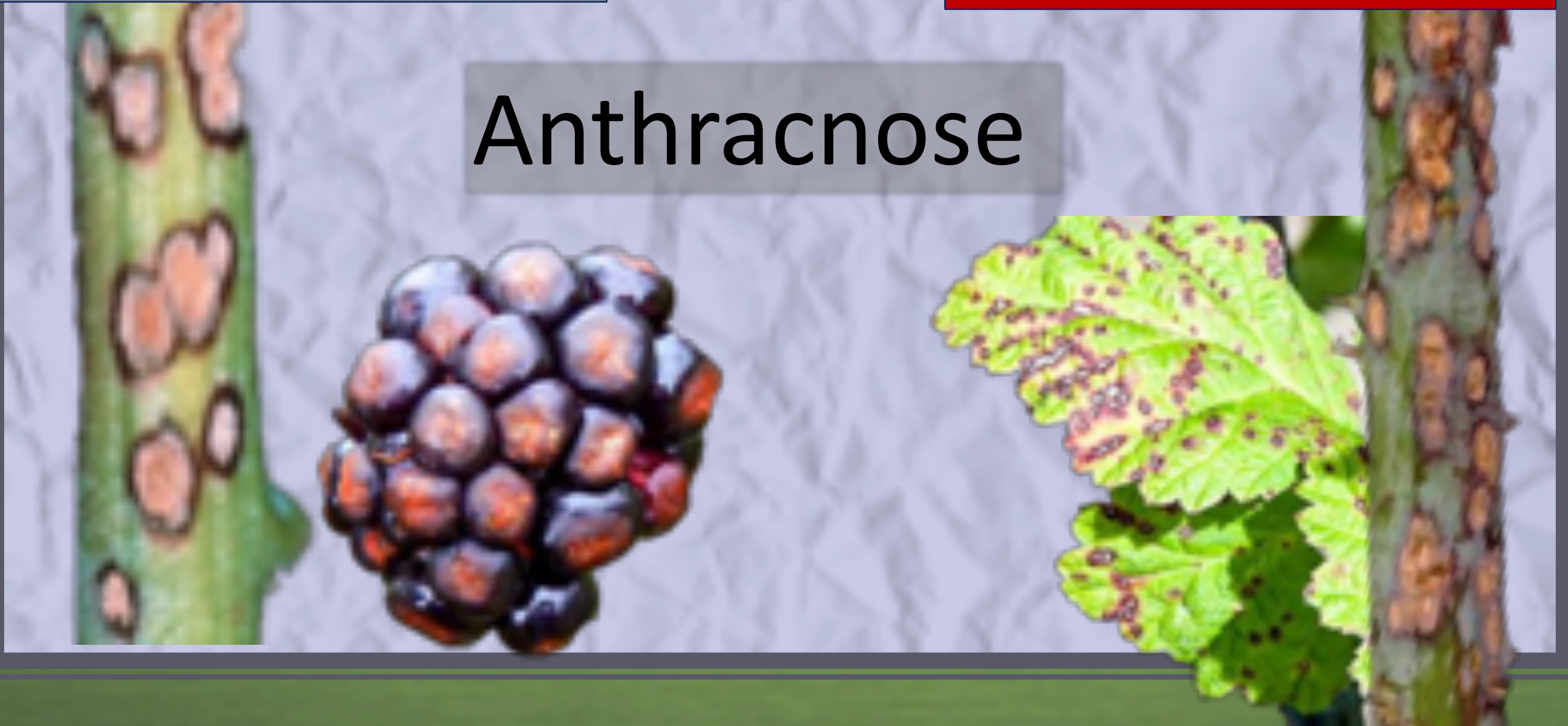
