Mechanical

Involves the use of tools (or hands) to cut, dislodge, remove or otherwise kill weeds

- Garden Hoe

Cultivation vs. Weeding

Cultivating:

Loosening and aerating the soil at a shallow depth

Weeding:

Removing established weeds

Chemical

The use of any chemical agent to kill weeds

- 20% or 30% Vinegar
- OMRI Listed Herbicides

*In these concentrations, Vinegar is considered a strong acid. Always wear PPE and follow instructions on label

Preventative

Any measures that are taken to prevent the spread and establishement of weeds

- Using clean seed
- Keeping tools and equipment clean
- Weed barrier
- Much





Cultural

Maintaining field conditions in such a way that weeds are less likely to become established

- Crop spacing
- Soil fertility
- Cover crops
- Living mulch







Biological

The use of natural enemies to control a weed population

Using sheep in a pasture to control broad leaves

Fire

Using heat from the burning of propane fuel to kill weeds
